Course Prerequisites

GEOG 5200/5200S Cartography and Map Design

Course Description

This is a topic-oriented course focusing on the examination of concepts, techniques, issues, and applications in Geovisualization. Six major topics will be discussed in this course:

- Bivariate mapping
- Multivariate mapping
- 3D visualization
- Map animation
- Visualizing uncertainty

Web mapping

The course is divided into weekly modules based on the above topics. Classes will be held inperson at the scheduled time. Approximately half of the course will be lectures introducing concepts and theories of Geovisualization. The rest of the course will provide hands-on experience as labs on interactive mapping and visualization of geographic data with ArcGIS Pro and other software.

Credit Hours and Work Expectations

This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to <u>Ohio State bylaws on instruction</u> (go.osu.edu/credit hours), students should expect around 3 hours per week spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of C average.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

Syllabus Quiz & ESRI web-course

Description: The first class will be a detailed explanation of course expectations, policies, deliverables, schedule of classes etc. You are expected to read the syllabus before and after the class to get yourself familiar with all the requirements in this course. It is highly encouraged to be prepared to ask questions about course content in the very first lecture. There will be syllabus quiz to be taken after the first class to make sure you know the syllabus.

All the labs in this course require you to work on ESRI ArcPro software. Some of you may not be very familiar with the software because either you may not have taken any GIS courses in recent past or have used other versions of GIS software (such as ArcMap, QGIS etc). To brush up your Arc Pro skills, there is a <u>mandatory</u> refresher ESRI web-course to be done by you prior to starting the labs. More information will be provided in the first lecture class.

Labs

Description: There will be 9 labs during this class, and each lab will have an assignment. For each assignment, you will need to answer several questions and may be asked to upload your maps. Assignment questions will be provided to you in advance at the end of each lab's instruction. The lab may consist of both guided and unguided exercises. More information will be provided by your lab TA in the first lab meeting.

Lab questions: If you have any questions on lab contents and/or grades (can't finish specific steps, tools are not working, etc.), please contact your TA via email.



Attendance

Description: Attendance in both lectures and labs is **mandatory** and will be recorded at all class meetings. Presence during classes help students to understand and work in a coherent way. Our prior experience shows that those students who regularly show up in the lectures & labs learn more from their peers and instructors than those who prefer to work/study on their own (skipping class attendance). To encourage lab presence and productivity, attendance is made worth up to 5% of your final grades in this course. However, <u>2 unexcused absences will not be counted in the attendance grade</u> to cover any emergency or unexpected event that may prevent you coming to the labs. In case of any health emergency such as COVID19 related absences, please make sure to inform your Lab TA and me as soon as possible to get special arrangements as per policies. Documented proof may be required to get your attendance excused.

Essays

Description: There will be 4 short essay assignments focusing on the topics of 3D, Animation, Uncertainty, and Web mapping. Reading material will be available on CarmenCanvas. After reading papers related to each theme, you will choose one paper and submit an essay of the Geovisualization method covered by the readings, via the course website. Please refer to course schedule for due dates and keep a watch on announcements for more information.

Exams

Description: There will be 2 non-cumulative, open-book exams. They will contain multiple choices and blank filling questions related to only the lecture contents. Exams will be administered online using course website. More details will be provided later in class.

Exams must be taken at the scheduled times and places unless you have informed your instructor *before* the exam with proper reasons and documents and got approved by the instructor. Please contact your instructor in advance of the scheduled exam to schedule a make-up exam, except in the case of emergency. Make-up exams for excused absences will not be penalized. Make-up exams for unexcused absences will be penalized 15%.

Final Project

Description: Students will complete a final project that focuses on a particular question of interest. The project will consist of making a proposal, submitting a final report and maps, and presenting. More details will be provided later in class.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments, including discussion posts, should be your own original work. In formal assignments, you should follow APA style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to



proofread your assignments before you turn them in but no one else should revise or rewrite your work.

Late Assignments

Please refer to Carmen for due dates. Assignments will be penalized 10% for each business day late. Thus, assignments submitted 10 business days after the deadline will be graded 0. Extensions will not be granted due to lost work; be sure you back up and keep all your work.

Discussion and Communication Guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

Writing style: While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. A more conversational tone is fine for non-academic topics.

Tone and civility: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online. I will provide specific guidance for discussions on controversial or personal topics.

Citing your sources: When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.

Backing up your work: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.

Synchronous sessions: During our Zoom sessions I ask you to use your real name and a clear photo of your face in your Carmen profile. During our full-group lecture time, you may turn your camera off if you choose. When in breakout rooms or other small-group discussions, having cameras and mics on as often as possible will help you get the most out of activities. You are always welcome to use the <u>free</u>, <u>Ohio State-themed virtual backgrounds</u> (go.osu.edu/zoom-backgrounds). Remember that Zoom and the Zoom chat are our classroom space where respectful interactions are expected.]
