Geospatial has become a ubiquitous term in a wide range of applications where spatial data, GIS, mapping, remote sensing, spatial data analytics, and spatial decision making are involved. For a practitioner in this broad field of geographical information science and technology (GIST), what does “being professional” mean? Is doing your job competently enough to be at your job? What constitutes professional competence in this profession? This course will help you address these questions and, more importantly, help you find your moral compass in a profession that is at the cutting-edge of today’s constant social and technological advances.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Explain GIST as a profession and related skills
- Demonstrate understanding of GIST as an industry and organization
- Development professional profile and resume
- Evaluate strengths and limitations of their own skill set
- Evaluate different career paths in GIST and other fields
- Conduct practitioner interviews
- Identify ethical issues of geospatial technology and its applications
- Evaluate decision options regarding ethical issues in geospatial applications
- Discuss ethics in classroom and in workplace
- Demonstrate moral reasoning skills through methodical analysis of ethical case studies

- Describe various philosophical frameworks upon which codes of ethics are based
- Defend or refute a decision as GIST professional for applications when ethical issues are involved

How this course works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into weekly modules that are released one week ahead of time. Each module is organized around a specific topic (see course schedule below) and consists of introduction videos, reading materials, and student activities (see assignment information below). Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3-credit-hour course. According to [Ohio State policy](#), a 3-credit hour course comprises 3 hours of instruction in class (including online instruction content and Carmen activities) and 6 hours of homework/study time outside class per week, for a total of 9 hours per course per week, for the student to earn a C grade.

Assignment information

This course is organized around five types of activities. Students should carefully review the academic integrity policies in the subsequent section that pertain to all assignments of this class.

Reflection papers. During the semester, each student is required to write 3 reflection papers. Each paper should focus on one week's topic since the previous paper. Each paper will be 5 pages long, double spaced with 12pt font and normal margins. The papers will be graded based on how they adequately address the papers of the week selected, as well as the style and quality of writing. Detailed rubric will be provided along with the assignments.

Reading quizzes. There will be about 5 timed, open-book quizzes through the semester. Each quiz will cover the reading materials since the previous quiz. The quizzes are automatically graded and instructions will be provided beforehand.

Professional profile. All students in this class are required to develop a professional profile on LinkedIn and provide constructive suggestions through peer review of other students' profiles.

GIST practitioner interview. All students in this class are required to identify a practitioner and interview him/her regarding professionalism and ethics. Undergraduate

students are not required to conduct the interview per se, but are required to discuss the interview process and to peer review the interview reports.

Participation. Student should fully engage with the discussions in this class. More information about participating in online discussions can be found below in the section of "Attendance, participation, and discussions." In addition, students will also peer review different documents throughout the semester.

Submissions and late assignments

All submissions must be done on Carmen (unless otherwise specified). **There will be absolutely no email submissions.** Email submissions of work for this class will not be acknowledged and will not be accepted.

Except for the discussion forum and some surveys, late submissions will be accepted up to a week past the due date. A 10% penalty will be imposed on each day the work is submitted late for the first four days. Five to seven days late will only receive 50% credit of the grade you would have received if it is submitted on time. If you contact me **ahead of time** for deadline adjustments, you will not incur any penalty.

Please note this policy does not apply to discussion forum. If you have any concerns about keeping pace with the discussion forum, please discuss with me in the first week of the semester.

Attendance, participation, and discussions

Because this is a distance-education course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of everyone's expected participation:

- **Logging in:** Be sure you are logging in to the course in Carmen each week, including weeks with holidays or weeks with minimal online course activity. (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible.
- **Office hours and live sessions:** This course is asynchronous and has no live sessions. I will be on zoom during my office hours. But if you want to discuss the class outside my scheduled office hours, please contact me at the beginning of the week.
- **Discussion leader:** All student are required to participate in discussion forums. At the beginning of the semester, each student will sign up to be the discussion leader (or co-leaders if necessary) for a discussion forum. The discussion leaders will prepare questions related to the week's topic and start off each week's discussion at the beginning of the week. The discussion leaders also monitor the discussion and ask follow-up questions. At the end of the week, the discussion leader will also summarize the discussions. Students may peer-review the discussion leaders and their summaries. More instructions will be provided for discussion leaders to formulate their questions.

- Discussion participation. To receive credit as a participant, students should engage discussion leader's posts substantively and repeatedly. What does that mean? Substantive engagement means weighing in with your own answers and/or follow up questions. Repeated engagement means that you should be responding to multiple questions throughout the week, and should follow-up to content related to your posts.
- Students will also be asked to peer-review various assignments, including their LinkedIn profiles.
- Student should also attend a mid-semester one-on-one meeting with me. This will be a 10 to 15 minute meeting, planned for the week after the spring break.

Discussion and communication guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

- **Writing style:** While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. Informality (including an occasional emoticon) is fine for non-academic topics.
- **Tone and civility:** Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.
- **Citing your sources:** When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. (For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.)
- **Backing up your work:** Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.

- Collaboration and informal peer-review: The course includes many opportunities for formal collaboration with your classmates.
