### **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES**

This course provides students with professional work experience that connects with their major and may be helpful towards developing a career. Although students do not meet in a classroom, several short written assignments are posted in the **Discussion** section of the Carmen course page so that they can read each other's entries and compare their experiences. Students have the option (not a requirement) to respond to other student's entries. Students post other assignments in the **Assignment** section (see section on Written Assignments, p. x).

This course is intended to help students develop the skills and knowledge:

- To apply what has been learned in geography major courses in a practical setting.
- To expand upon what has been learned in geography major courses.
- To continue development of communication skills.
- To gain experience in a professional setting.
- To work independently and in teams.

## REQUIRED READING

Students read short articles from the Arts & Sciences Center for Career and Professional Success that will aid them in their professional work experience and in completing written assignments that help them reflect on their experience and its significance. All required reading is accessible online under **Modules** as well as in the Weekly Course Schedule, pp. 3-4 of the **Syllabus**.

## WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS

Students complete short written assignments and post them on Carmen. Responses should be complete and well written. *Guidelines for each assignment are on the course Carmen page in **Modules***, which lists weekly instructions and assignments. **Assignments will be marked 'unsatisfactory' if posted later than the due date, unless alternative arrangements are made with the instructor.**

*On the Carmen page in **Modules** (weekly schedule), when you click on an assignment, you will automatically be taken either to Assignments or Discussions, depending on where your assignment should be posted.*

Assignments include:

1) Statement of Intent, post in **Discussion** section of Carmen page (**due Monday, Aug. 26**):

Students indicate basic information about themselves and their internship; *see elaborated guidelines on the Carmen page*. (1 paragraph)

2. Weekly Journal entries, **due once each week**: Students post a journal entry once a week (at least one paragraph) in the **Discussion** section of the Carmen course page; the Statement of Intent (above) includes a statement indicating by which day each week you will submit your weekly journal entry. Journal entries should capture the students' general thoughts and reactions to their work experience. Notes regarding experiences relating to the learning objectives and connections to academic coursework will be helpful for reference when completing in Internship Final Report. Students post their first entry by the end of the 2<sup>nd</sup> week of their internship (see Weekly Schedule, pp. 3-4).

3) Expectations and Reality, post in **Discussion** section of Carmen page (**due Monday, Sept. 16**): Students indicate both their expectations for their internship, the nature of their work practices relative their expectations, and specify the differences, if any, between their expectations and work realities; *see elaborated guidelines on the Carmen page*. (1 paragraph minimum)

4) Interview, post in **Assignment** section of Carmen page (**due Monday, Oct. 21**): Students identify one person in an occupation/position they are interested in learning more about, schedule and complete the interview, and complete a written report that summarizes the experience and what they learned; *see elaborated guidelines on the Carmen page*. (minimum of two pages)

5) Resume, post in **Assignment** section of Carmen page (**due Tuesday, Nov. 5**): Students create and submit a professional resume and cover letter that could be used to apply for their next internship or full time employment opportunity; *see elaborated guidelines on the Carmen page*.

6) Cover Letter, post in the Assignment section of the Carmen page (due Tuesday, November 12). Students create and submit a professional cover letter that could be used to apply for another internship or for a full employment opportunity.

7) Final Report (due Monday, Nov. 25): Students complete a final report that summarizes their work experience. The report should include an overview of significant work activities, a reflective evaluation of these experiences, and what was learned as well as connections to academic work; *see elaborated guidelines on the Carmen page*. (2 pages minimum)

8) Verification Form (see link on Carmen page under Guidelines for Written Assignments + Verification Form). This form is to be completed by the student at the end of the semester to document the completed work, then reviewed and verified by the student’s supervisor. The completed form is ungraded but required for course completion. Failure to complete and submit this form by Wednesday, Dec. 4, 2019, will result in a final grade of Unsatisfactory.

**EVALUATION**

Students are evaluated on the basis of Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory. The weighting of the assignments for evaluation is as follows:

Journal Entries (total):	15%
Statement of Intent Discussion:	5%
Expectations and Reality Discussion:	10%
Informational Interview	25%
Cover Letter and Resume	25%
Final Report	20%

Each assignment will be evaluated as S or U. Successful completion of the course to receive a Satisfactory final grade requires that students receive ‘satisfactory’ on 75% of course assignments.

**Carmen Access**

You will need to use [BuckeyePass](#) multi-factor authentication to access your course in Carmen. To ensure that you are able to connect to Carmen at all times, it is recommended that you take the following steps:
