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COURSE OVERVIEW

Course description

This course examines the spatial and system-wide aspects of transportation in the U.S. and internationally. It covers transportation methods at the introductory level and emphasizes the applications and critical views of the transportation system.

Course learning outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Summarize key theories underlying the spatial organization and operations of transportation systems.
- Analyze interconnections within and between social, environmental, and transportation systems.
- Interpret patterns in transportation systems.
- Apply concepts and methods to solve real-world problems in transportation.
- Identify strengths and weaknesses of theories and methods.
- Identify consequences of development processes and affected parties.
- Recognize and value differences in interests of stakeholders.
- Evaluate the outcomes and performance of a transportation system.

HOW THIS ONLINE COURSE WORKS

Mode of delivery: This class is 100% online. All video lectures and learning materials will be uploaded on Carmen Canvas. There will be additional components:

- Group active learning activities through Microsoft Teams (asynchronous and synchronous; time to be determined by group members and approved by instructors).
- Individual and group discussions through Carmen discussion board (asynchronous).
- Online check-ins with the instructors on Zoom (synchronous, time booked on Carmen Calendar).

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy (<u>go.osu.edu/credithours</u>), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content, group and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

- **Participating in online activities for attendance**: **AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK** You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. You will answer a Carmen quiz to earn participation points. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with us *as soon as possible*.
- Office hours and check-in sessions: RECOMMENDED All live, scheduled events for the course, including my office hours, are recommended.
- **Participating in discussion forums**: **2+ TIMES PER WEEK** As part of your participation, each week you can expect to post at least twice as part of our substantive class discussion on the week's topics.

Communications with instructors: Questions related to class materials and assignments should be posted on Carmen discussion board under the thread created for that particular week. We will check these posts once per school day. We encourage you to help your classmates out if you know the answers, but make sure you are not violating the code of student conduct (e.g., do not upload your assignment or show them the exact answer to complete their assignments).

Other questions can be directed to the instructors <u>via email</u> (always include both instructors in your emails, in case one of us is unavailable).

Descriptions of major course assignments

Assignments 1-4

Description: In each assignment, you will create a short memo for transportation practitioners to support them in the decision making process. You will use knowledge, theories, and methods that you learned in this class to explain and address problems in the real world.

Academic integrity and collaboration: This is an individual assignment. You may discuss the asignments and approaches to solve the problems with your classmates, however, you may not share your written papers with them or provide them with the direct answers. See also: *Academic integrity policy*.

Group project (for undergraduate students)

Description: You will work with 4-6 other students in a team, select a transportation-related topic in a city of your choice, and apply the knowledge that you learned in this class to address problems in real world such as traffic safety, congestions, and equity. Your group will create a poster to present the problem, approach, and results to the class.

Academic integrity and collaboration: This is a group assignment. You will collaborate with your groupmates in all stages of this assignment. You will provide peer evaluation at the end. A grade will be assigned individually based on each member's contribution.

Final paper (for graduate students)

Description:

Academic integrity and collaboration: This is an individual assignment. You may discuss with your classmates about this paper, but you may not use any ideas that are not your own without properly citing the sources. See also: *Academic integrity policy*.

Details about each assignment, including guidelines and rubric, will be made available on Carmen Canvas.

Late submissions

By default, late submissions of assignments and final project are penalized by 10% for each late day. Late submissions for discussion posts and mini homework will not be graded.

You have <u>one</u> opportunity to extend your deadline <u>for one day</u> during the semester (indicate it in your submission to get the full credit). This extension will be applied to an assignment of your choice (including the final project or paper). No permission is required; you will indicate in your submission that you are using the one-day extension. We suggest that you use this opportunity wisely and reserve it for the end of the semester when the workload is unusually high.

In case of personal and family emergencies, please notify me as soon as possible so that we can work out a new submission time. Such extensions will be granted on a case-by-case basis.

Discussion and communication guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

- Writing style: While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. A more conversational tone is fine for non-academic topics.
- **Citing your sources**: When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.
- **Backing up your work**: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
- **Tone and civility**: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.

Meaningful and constructive dialogue is encouraged in this class and requires a degree of mutual respect, willingness to listen, and tolerance of opposing points of view. Respect for individual differences and alternative viewpoints will be maintained at all times in this class through group meetings, online check-in's, and Carmen discussion board. One's words and use of language should be temperate and within acceptable bounds of civility and decency.
