Course Description:

Geography is a multifaceted discipline with close connections to many fields within both the social and physical sciences. Using this integrative, geographic perspective, Geography 3750 addresses the demographic, economic, political, cultural, and historical forces that have created today's North America.

The course will be roughly divided into five modules. **Module 1** will provide us with an introduction to North America through a survey of the region's physical environment and regional diversity. In **Module 2**, we will look at issues of settlement and population including past and present immigration attitudes/policies, cultural identities, and general demographic patterns. **Module 3** will focus on economic issues including industrialization, postindustrial change, and the impact of capitalism. We will then move to **Module 4** which will address a variety of urban issues such as suburbanization, urban sprawl, urban poverty, gentrification and racial/ethnic segregation. In **Module 5**, we will explore the topics of political voice and democracy. During most of the semester, we will concentrate on the United States but we will incorporate information about Canada and Mexico as we go.

GE Category: Social Diversity in the United States

Goals: Students' understanding of the pluralistic nature of institutions, society, and culture in the United States is enhanced.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Students describe the roles of such categories as race, gender, class, ethnicity, and religion in the pluralistic institutions and cultures of the United States.
- 2. Students recognize the role of social diversity in shaping their own attitudes and values regarding appreciation, tolerance, and equality of others.

End Of Semester Grades:

I do not round up, nor do I provide opportunity for additional extra credit beyond the extra credit points offered on the exams. Your grade will be based on the points you have earned according to the scale above, no matter how close you are to the next grade.

Exercises:

Exercises 1 and 2 will involve your own thoughts and critical analysis of information presented in the course; they are not "research" assignments. More details about each of these exercises will be provided on the "assigned" dates indicated on the syllabus.

Testing Center:

You will take all exams and map quizzes at the Testing Center at 585 Student Academic Services Building, 281 West Lane Avenue. You must set up an appointment in advance for each exam and map quiz. When you go to the Testing Center, you will be seated at a computer terminal where you will log in to Carmen to take the scheduled exam or quiz. A testing center official will enter the necessary password to unlock the quizzes and exams. Refer to the **Testing Center Appointments and Information** document on Carmen for more information about the Testing Center and the necessary link for you to make your test and quiz appointments.

Map Quizzes:

Each map quiz will consist of 25 fill-in questions that you will answer by referring to maps that are included with the quiz questions. Map Quiz 1 will cover physical features, Map Quiz 2 will cover political units, and Map Quiz 3 will cover urban centers. See the *Map Quiz Preparation Guide* for the exact features and places you will need to know for each quiz. You will be given 15 minutes to complete each map quiz. Remember that all map quizzes for the entire semester will be available by the second week of classes, so you can complete some or all of these quizzes well in advance of their due dates if you prefer to work ahead.

Exams:

The exams will consist of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. The content and format of each exam will be discussed in more detail as exam dates approach. You will be given 90 minutes to complete each exam. Exams must be completed on the specific date indicated on the course schedule, but you can schedule the time that is most convenient for you on that date. The Testing Center is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., so be sure that you start your exam sometime before 3:30 p.m. on scheduled exam days.

Makeups:

Dates for exams and map quizzes are listed on the *Course Schedule*; please plan your semester accordingly and arrange times with the Testing Center to take exams and quizzes within the required time frames. Since we will not have class on scheduled exam days, this will help with your scheduling.

Since quizzes are available well in advance of their due dates and they only require 15 minutes to complete, it is unlikely that a map quiz makeup will be granted. You should plan to do your quizzes in advance of the due date so that you do not run the risk of missing a map quiz.

No make-ups will be given without a signed and verifiable statement from a medical professional explaining that it was impossible for you to take an exam or quiz within the required time frames. If you do have a medical excuse (as described in the preceding sentence), you must send me an e-mail message as soon as you know that you will miss the exam so that we can arrange a time for a makeup. If you know in advance that you will not be able take an exam at the scheduled time because of a verifiable medical condition (e.g. scheduled medical procedure such as surgery), please inform me of this situation as soon in the semester as possible.

If you are given permission to take a make-up exam or quiz, please be aware that it may differ from the original exam in both format and content.

Attendance Policy:

You are expected to attend every class from beginning to end. Attendance will be taken at some point during each class session. If you are not present when attendance is taken, you will be recorded as absent. If you miss part of a class session because you arrive late or leave early, you will still be recorded as absent if you are not present in class at the time when attendance is taken. Please be sure that you sign the attendance list every day. You will not be allowed, under any circumstances, to sign the attendance list at a later date. If you find that frequent absences are unavoidable because of work schedules, frequent illnesses, etc., you should not take this class.

Do Yourself A Favor; Do Not Miss Class!

Lectures will **NOT** be verbal repetitions of the assigned readings. A significant amount of class time will be devoted to discussions of issues related to the lectures and readings, and video viewing. Information from all of these classroom activities will be covered on exams. Although I will post lecture study questions and some selected graphics (e.g. maps, tables, & diagrams) after every class, these will **NOT** contain all of the details and explanations included with the original lectures presented in class. For all of these reasons, coming to class is essential if you wish to receive a good grade.

If must miss a class, <u>regardless of the reason</u>, you are responsible for making arrangements <u>with a classmate</u> to get notes and to learn of any announcements that were made in class.

I am available during the office hours listed on the syllabus. If necessary, we can also set up individual appointments at times other than "official" office hours. You are highly encouraged to contact me after class or via e-mail to set up an appointment if you would like to see me and are unable to meet with me during regular office hours. Sometimes, I do not hear from a student who is having problems until late in the semester; by that time, many of the opportunities for grade improvement have already passed.
